#### Presbyterian Women of Mission Presbytery Mission Interpreter Report - Carole McCauley

Presbyterian Women of Mission Presbytery are divided into five cluster groups. Each cluster has both large and small churches in rural, suburban, and urban areas. One of the characteristics for each cluster is a strong sense of mission. Mission activity reports are compiled each year. The information is shared each Spring at the Mission Presbytery Women's Conference at Mo-Ranch, so churches know what others are doing and to "spark" ideas for additional ways to help our neighbors.

#### Food Insecurity

All churches reported many ways to address food insecurity in their neighborhoods. Activities include church food pantries, participation in local food banks, providing food to local emergency shelters, and community gardens. Volunteers staff food pantries, drive for meals on wheels, provide backpacks for children with food to take home on the weekends, provide lunches and meals for homeless youth, and regular community wide meals.

One church has a little food pantry modeled after free library boxes. The pantry is available on the church grounds by the road 24 hours a day, it is stocked with single serve peanut butter crackers, soup, stew, pasta, and water.

#### **Housing**

Activities to support permanent, temporary, and transitional housing are mentioned in many of the cluster reports. Jackson Woods Presbyterian Church in Corpus Christi has a cottage ministry of four cottages to provide housing for elderly neighbors. Other churches participate in Habitat for Humanity, Family Promise, and local programs providing transitional housing for those in need.

#### Children and Teens

Children and teen programs hold a special place for Presbyterian Women. Many groups reported back to school drives for clothing, shoes, and school supplies. Churches also support family crisis centers with gifts of snacks, comfort bags, quilts, and stuffed animals, and volunteer hours. Churches throughout Mission Presbytery support Presbyterian Children's Homes and Services (PCHAS) throughout the year with monetary gifts, donations of school supplies, and Christmas projects.

#### Disaster Relief

Many of our groups have answered the call from Presbyterian Disaster Assistance for cleanup buckets and hygiene kits provided to people after natural disasters. This is an ongoing need. The completed buckets and kits are stored in multiple places throughout the presbytery when disaster strikes.

#### Presbyterian Giving Catalog

Some groups have selected one or more projects from the Presbyterian Giving Catalog to meet the needs of people around the world. Sewing machines, farm bundles, livestock including pigs, flocks of chickens and cows are mentioned as short-term mission projects.

#### Hands On Projects

Making prayer shawls and quilts is an active ministry in many congregations. Other sewing projects include making adult bibs for hospice patients, and gowns and blankets for hospitalized children. Additional knitting and crochet projects include soft bears and other toys, hats, and scarves for those needing warm winter clothing.

At a recent San Antonio cluster mission event participants were asked how do you spend your time in service to others? 1 Peter 4:10 (NIV) reminds us that each of us should use whatever gifts we have received to serve others as faithful stewards of God's grace in many ways.

This report is just a snapshot of the various projects throughout Mission Presbytery as Presbyterian Women respond to the question of how we will serve others.

## Finding Resilience, Joy, and Our Identity in Jesus Christ

In this Bible study, we will explore resilience. This is modeled for us by several biblical characters, gospel and epistle writers, as well as Jesus. So, what exactly is resilience?

Resilience is the ability to spring back into shape and to adapt well in the face of adversity, trauma, tragedy, threats, or stress—such as from family, relationships, health, workplace, and financial stressors. People who survive and thrive well in change are resilient.

The Bible study is also about joy. How do we find joy in a chaotic world? Christian joy may be different from how a lot of people define joy.

Joy is sometimes confused with happiness. For Christians, joy can occur while we are in the midst of difficult circumstances. Joy is the second fruit of the spirit, preceded by love and followed by peace. [Gal. 5:22-23] Trusting in God when we are in trying times can fill us with glorious joy and peace. We have joy in our suffering, because ultimately our joy is found in Jesus Christ.

We will also seek to rediscover our identity.

*Toentity* is more than who we are or who we show ourselves to be. At its core, it points to our humanity. Our core identity is not found in our titles, our positions, our spouses, our partners, or our possessions. For Christians, our identity is found in Jesus Christ.

#### Journey of Faith

My earliest memory of Jesus is when I was four years of age. It was a Sunday night and I recall being supernaturally healed. My parents were taking me to the emergency room and I told them to take me to church instead because Jesus would heal me. Reluctantly, they did. They then proceeded to take me to the emergency room in spite of my protests. When the doctor called my name, I was restored to wholeness and my father informed the doctor, "Never mind, we are going home. Jesus has healed my son."

I was baptized in water when I was about twelve, preached my first sermon at the age of 13 and also taught Sunday school to the high schoolers. Later, when I was entering high school as a freshman, the Lord baptized me with the Holy Spirit and I was given the gift of speaking in tongues.

At the age of 16, I suffered a great disappointment and by 18 years of age I started to seek nefarious spiritual paths. These paths lead me into some very dark encounters, yet I continued going to church, playing the piano, and teaching Sunday school to adults.

My darkest days were reserved until I was in my thirties where the Good Lord brought me through a life threatening crisis. By God's grace alone, I stand whole, sane, and healed.

In my forties, I no longer felt accepted in the denomination I grew up in. A friend advised me to look into the Presbyterian Church as he felt my theology and beliefs best aligned with them. I took his counsel and I have found my home.

For most of my life I can remember people telling me that I had a call on my life, that God had anointed me, that ... I grew tired of people telling me this and I not hearing from God directly.

Until a few years ago, I told the Lord that if he had placed a call on my life to let me know for myself and if not to please make people stop telling me otherwise. Within a week, I received a call asking me if I would consider being moderator elect for Mission Presbytery. The following year I was the moderator and the next year after that, I chaired the General Council of Mission Presbytery. Serendipitously, I met the widow of a former associate pastor of mine and she asked me to consider assisting Crestholme Presbyterian Church with pulpit supply. I accepted and now I have filled pulpit there for the past seven years. I went to General Assembly three years ago and there I was asked to be a Commission at Large with Synod of the Sun. In December of this year, I complete my three year commitment. I currently serve as a consultant to HMMN and as a coach for Houses of Hope through Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary. Most recently, I was called upon to serve as a presenter for some regional workshops for Reimagining Hispanic Ministries within the PC(USA). I still remember the sensation coming over me and knowing that I knew the Lord had called me into his service.

It was the Rev. Tom Heger who vetted me to fill pulpit at Crestholme. I am indebted to him for life. It was he who counseled me to form a discernment team. And thanks to him, I continue to have this team. For every opportunity listed above I consulted them for a "green," light. These people love the Lord and they love me too, for which I am eternally grateful!

And now I find myself on the threshold of ordination. Only GOD!

#### Faith Journey

#### Rev. Matt Morse

A "cradle" Presbyterian, some of my earliest memories include VBS, singing in the church children's choir, and watching my dad play for the church softball team. As I got older, annual youth group ministry trips to build houses and teach children in the colonias along the Texas/Mexico border, being pressed to consider my beliefs in confirmation class, and assisting in worship leadership impacted my faith journey.

When my dad was diagnosed with Stage IV cancer while I was in middle school, my faith was challenged with the ever-present question: why do bad things happen to good people? It was about that time too I began to come to terms with anxiety issues, complicated perhaps by bullying both at school and even (sadly) in the church youth group. Through it all, however, my faith was buoyed by one pastor, and my first spiritual mentor, Greg McDonnell, who served our church from when we joined in 1981 until after I left for college in 1996. His graciousness toward me and my family, and his inclusiveness of youth in church leadership made an impact upon me.

Arriving at UT Austin, I immediately found a church home at UPC, in both the campus ministry group and as a scholarship singer in the choir. A second spiritual mentor, David Forney entered the picture and helped me so much as I integrated into university life away from home for the first time. He also – with Bill Greenway, Cindy Rigby and other seminary faculty – stretched my faith imagination and led me to a broader view of theology and church. Upon graduation, I resisted the call to ordained ministry (despite some encouragement from others) partly because my grandfather was a pretty well-known minister in the Synod, instead taking my talents to LBJ high school teaching history and geography.

Yet, at some point the tug became too strong to resist, and even though I wasn't sure what would come of it, I pursued graduate studies at APTS, and eventually candidacy in Mission Presbytery. Most significantly, was my teaching church internship working with spiritual mentor (#3!) Gail Snodgrass at Genesis PC in Austin, where she pushed me hard to consider how I was different, my gifts different, than my grandfather's. Between that and my CPE unit at Brackenridge, I learned so much about empathy, grace, and conflict resolution, all of which has benefitted me in parish ministry.

I could tick off the rest of the story: a Lily Residency in Ann Arbor, my first solo call in Taylor, MI, and then years excluded from ordered ministry because while I was effective in ministry and always felt confirmed in my call, personally, especially after a divorce, I did not make good choices.

Yet in that time away I was able to immerse myself in other non-profit endeavors focused on mental health and children's advocacy, while getting to be with family in Texas again. I treasure that time even more since my dad passed two years ago — a 30-year survivor of cancer but taken down this time by that horrible disease. And to meet my wife, Ashley, and with her welcome two amazing children, Ethan (10) and Brynn (9). In my early thirties, out of ministry and returning to Texas with (as they say) my tail between my legs, never imagining I would 15 years later have such blessings in my life. Lynn Hargrove (spiritual mentor #4) was gracious and accepted my past missteps and sins and welcomed me into New Covenant Presbytery six years ago, and the rest, as they say, is, well, the rest. And to a new call in parish ministry at Parkway church. My family and I are thrilled at this opportunity.

Through the zigs and zags, this "cradle" Presbyterian finds his faith only strengthened by the highs and the lows, and with appreciation for those who have nurtured me along the way, mentors and family and friends. No words are truer than those which have guided this Gen-Xer all these years, on the border, at church camps, in corporate worship, or around a Mo-Ranch bonfire: "God is good. All the time. All the time. God is good."

#### Statement of Faith - Matt Morse

My trust is in the Lord, who out of love created all things, naming creation "good." The One who desires a relationship with us, giving us the Law to show us how to act toward one another and rightly worship God. Yet we sin and rebel against Divine Love. God sent messengers over time to lead us to repentance and to embrace a love for God and one another that desires justice, loves mercy, and walks humbly with our Creator. God sent the Son, Jesus, because God understood that only by the Word made flesh could we ever be fully reconciled to the Divine Love of which we were created.

Jesus demonstrated this Divine Love in his life on earth and in calling others to honor the command to love God with all our heart, soul, and mind, and to love one another as ourselves. He taught of the trappings of wealth; that discipleship isn't easy but requires sacrifice and commitment. He spoke of a new way of life - "Kingdom living" - where the first are last, and the last are honored first.

Because his teaching and way of life caused a threat to the people in authority (both religious and secular), he was killed on a cross. By faith, I understand what happened on the cross was nothing less than the, once and for all, only necessary sacrifice to reconcile us sinners to God who wants to love us completely and eternally. The empty tomb proclaims a new reality in which sin and death no longer have the final word over us or our world. We respond to God's grace by living lives of gratitude to God and in service to others.

As the Resurrected Son returned to the Father, the Holy Spirit was sent to sanctify and seal the Church for its life together. That Spirit is still present in our midst whenever we gather for worship and is the inspiration behind the Holy Scripture, written and read, God's living Word revealed to and for us. It is the Spirit that lifts up, unites, and sustains the one Church to carry out the witness of Christ until he comes. Our Confessions give both historical and theological context and substance to our life together guiding us in expressing our beliefs through word and action.

I believe the doctrines of the Reformed Faith to be sound interpretations of what the Scriptures teach us. We are saved by God's grace in Christ, and our works are a grateful response to what God has already done for us in reconciling us to God in Christ for this life and the life to come. I believe we are elected by God for service and the sharing of gifts. As we are all one in Christ, I affirm the priesthood of all believers and a sharing of leadership in the church among the baptized.

Together, we look expectantly to the coming Kingdom of God, even as we live out our faith here and now. We do this in the preaching of the Word, in our celebration of the sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper, and in responding to Christ's commission to go and make disciples, to teach them what we have been taught, and in ministries of justice and compassion, especially to the "least of these" in whom we see Christ still.

General Council Report Mission Presbytery Meeting October 17-18, 2025

The General Council chair, Sheri Dittman, will be unable to attend this meeting. Fred Gamble, recent past General Council chair, will give the report.

#### For Presbytery Action

- 1. The General Council, via the Human Resources Committee, moves the approval of another five-year term for the Stated Clerk, Laurie Palmer.
- 2. Overture from Faith, Austin

"On Seeking God's Peace" is in the presbytery meeting packet.

The presbytery will vote on whether to send it to the General Assembly meeting next summer.

Marilyn White, a ruling elder from Faith, Austin, will be present to speak to the overture and answer questions.

#### On Seeking God's Peace Through Nuclear Disarmament in the 21st Century

#### Recommendation

The Presbytery of Mission overtures the 227th General Assembly (2026) of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to do the following:

- 1. Reaffirm the action of the 223rd General Assembly (2018), which called upon all members of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to take actions in defense of God's creation by working for nuclear disarmament; and acknowledging in particular the admonition to "find new peace strategies", call upon all members to carefully and prayerfully examine whether our current policies toward nuclear weapons are realistic.
- 2. Call on every congregation to commit to a year of study of three questions about nuclear weapons:
- a) What, objectively, is the level of risk involved in relying on nuclear deterrence for safety;
- b) What, realistically, is the practical military utility of nuclear weapons; and
- c) Is there a mythology wrapped around these weapons that falsely attributes god-like power to them?
- 3. Provide materials to make in-depth and serious study of these topics possible.
- 4. Call on our national leaders to take immediate action not to disarm unilaterally, but rather to assume the leadership of a worldwide effort to re-examine nuclear weapons realistically and begin a process of mutual disarmament.

#### Rationale

Unfortunately, most of what we think we know about nuclear weapons is a mixture of awe and exaggeration. Nuclear weapons did not "shock" Japan into surrendering; nuclear weapons are not the "ultimate" weapon — either on the battlefield or in long-range attacks on adversaries; and nuclear deterrence is not safe over the long run.

Their destructiveness is, however, entirely real. A single large nuclear weapon could leave a city in ruins and kill hundreds of thousands of its people. <sup>1</sup> A nuclear war would devastate the northern hemisphere and kill hundreds of millions of people. <sup>2</sup> However, the common exaggeration that nuclear war would "destroy all life on earth" is doubtful, if for no other reason than that there are 800 million people living in the Southern Hemisphere where there are no nuclear weapons.

In the anxiety, fear, and even paranoia of the Cold War, a kind of mythology was wrapped around nuclear weapons — a mythology that continues to warp perceptions and obscure their reality to this day.

We know Japan surrendered because the Soviet Union came into the war, not because of the atomic bombings. We know it because that's what Japan's leaders said they would do. In June of 1945 the Supreme Council — the ruling body of Japan at the time — agreed that if the Russians came into the war they would have to surrender.<sup>3</sup> And when the Russians came into the war two months later, Japan's leaders agreed to surrender in less than 27 hours.

We know that bombing Hiroshima and Nagasaki didn't force Japan to surrender because Japan's

leaders didn't care about city bombing. Japan's Supreme Council never discussed the massive campaign of city bombing that the United States inflicted on them during the summer of 1945. After the war, Navy Chief of Staff Toyoda Soemu said, "I do not believe that the question of air raids came up in the minds . . . [of the Supreme Council] . . . at all; that is, there was no idea that we must surrender to avoid even a single additional day of bombing." We know that nuclear weapons are not useful on the battlefield because the United States government has told us so. In 1991 President George H. W. Bush decided to unilaterally retire all but a symbolic handful of the U.S.'s battlefield nuclear weapons. And he did it with the support of the military.

Apparently, after years of careful study, U.S. political and military leaders became convinced that battlefield nuclear weapons had so little utility that they could safely be scrapped — whether anyone else scrapped theirs or not.

Nuclear explosions are so large that if you use one against your adversary's front line troops you end up killing some of your own troops. And the lethal radiation that the weapons release can by blown by the wind up to 25 miles in an hour — making it difficult to attack anything anywhere near the front lines.<sup>6</sup>

We know that using nuclear weapons for long-range wars is suicidal because no less an authority than President Ronald Reagan said it is. Reagan famously said, "A nuclear war cannot be won and must never be fought." <sup>7</sup> If you fight a war with nuclear weapons, after the war ends, your country will be crippled, starving, poisoned, and no longer in control of its own destiny.

We know that nuclear deterrence will inevitably lead to catastrophe over the long run. The problem is that nuclear deterrence, by its very nature, has to be perfect. Even a single failure could end up in a devastating war. This requirement, however, creates an insurmountable problem because all human beings are fallible. We all make mistakes. None of us can be perfect. And human beings are intimately involved in nuclear deterrence. Nuclear deterrence is a backand-forth process of threat and counter-threat that is entirely governed by human beings. Which means that if human beings are prone to folly — and we are; and if human beings are involved with nuclear deterrence — and we manage every step; then nuclear deterrence is, by definition, inherently flawed. It will fail. It cannot be perfect forever. Eventually, our luck will run out, and one of those failures will end in catastrophe.

It's not a question of if; it's just a matter of when.

How did these exaggerations come to be? The mythology was born on a windy night high on the empty plains of the American Southwest. When he watched the first atomic explosion, J. Robert Oppenheimer claimed that the words from the sacred Hindu text, the Bhagavad Gita suddenly came into his head: "Now I am Become Death, the Destroyer of Worlds." Another observer described it as: "A great blinding light . . . as if God himself had appeared among us. Then an explosion [like] a vision from the Book of Revelation." Someone else told of the awesome roar "which warned of Doomsday and made us feel we were blasphemous to dare tamper with the forces heretofore reserved to the Almighty."

"God himself," "Book of Revelation," "Doomsday," "Almighty" — the subtext of these words is rarely remarked on but is unmistakable: nuclear weapons have god-like power ("Destroyer of Worlds") and they confer that power onto their possessors ("Now *I am become* Death, . . .").

And to this day, we talk about nuclear weapons in tones touched with awe and fear. We call them the "ultimate" or "absolute" weapon — as if no other weapon could ever surpass them. We use "Apocalypse" (a final battle between gods and monsters at the end of the world) and "Armageddon" (the location in the Bible of Last Battle at the End of Days) as synonyms for nuclear war. We say nuclear weapons will always exist as if they weren't technology at all but some sort of eternal and everlasting deity. And we capitalize "the Bomb" the same way we capitalize only one other word — God.

Our talk reveals our beliefs. Nuclear weapons have been wrapped in a god-like mythology since the first moment of their existence. Their destructiveness is inarguable. But their military utility and consequently their importance in international relations have both been so exaggerated that policy makers have come to believe that nuclear weapons confer unimaginable power on their possessors.

The belief in the god-like power of nuclear weapons is vitally important because that myth is all that is holding us back from eliminating nuclear weapons. Weapons that are very dangerous and virtually useless get abandoned. Which is why chemical and biological weapons have been successfully banned. The treaties eliminating these weapons work because it is obvious that both types of weapons are very dangerous and, as a practical matter, very difficult to use in war.

If we could remove the mythology wrapped around nuclear weapons, the same would obviously be true about them — they are extremely dangerous, they are virtually unusable on the battlefield, they are suicidal to fight long-range wars with, and nuclear deterrence will inevitably fail over the long run. "Dangerous and virtually useless" is a common sense formula for abandoning technology. This is the key to eliminating nuclear weapons. <sup>10</sup>

We are called to dispel the deadly and dangerous mythology that enshrouds nuclear weapons. Our faith demands it. It is imperative for us because belief that nuclear weapons have god-like power violates the most fundamental teaching of what we believe. The very first commandment in the Old Testament says, "I am the Lord your God. ... You shall have no other gods before me." Surah 163 of the Quran says, "And your Allah is One Allah: there is no god but He, Most Gracious, Most Merciful." In First Corinthians 8, Paul tells us: "There is no God but the one. For even if there are so-called gods, whether in heaven or on earth ... yet for us there is but one God."

#### Robert's Rules of Order (RRO) /Parliamentary Procedure

RRO/Parliamentary Procedure helps the presbytery unify and be heard. It ensures that minority and majority opinions are heard. It offers a framework for fair discussion on the issues before us.

As presbytery commissioners, you have rights: to know, to speak, to vote, to hold office.

Three Parliamentary Principles:

- 1. The rights and the unity of the body shall be preserved.
- 2. the will of the majority shall prevail.
- 3. The rights of the minority shall be protected.

Fairness is at the heart of discerning the will of the body: We work together with respectful regard for each other.

Ask, "what is best for the whole presbytery?" and not, "What is best for me?"

#### Some Parliamentary Basics for Mission Presbytery Meetings

**The Moderator:** The Moderator of Mission Presbytery is elected to preside over our meetings and, in the Book of Order, "possesses the authority necessary for preserving order and for conducting efficiently the business of the body" (G-3.0104).

As needed, the Moderator rules on points of order.

DO NOT INSTRUCT/YELL AT THE MODERATOR THE RIGHT WAY TO APPLY ROBERTS RULES OF ORDER. THE STATED CLERK IS PRESENT TO HELP THE MODERATOR IF HE OR SHE NEEDS IT.

**Making a motion**: A motion is made and brought to a vote through these steps:

- Rise and walk to the mic so that the Moderator can give you a turn to have the floor as the recognized speaker. If unable to move to a mic, you may raise your hand to be recognized.
- 2. When the Moderator recognizes you, say your name, whether you're a minister or a ruling elder, and the congregation you represent.
- 3. State your motion, e.g., "Moderator, I move that Mission Presbytery serve homemade cinnamon rolls at every stated meeting."
- 4. The motion requires a second (the person offering the second does not need to be recognized), and the Moderator will restate your motion to be sure everyone hears it. You then speak to the motion, addressing the Moderator.
- 5. The Moderator will call for a discussion of the motion and will recognize members who wish to speak for or against it.
- 6. After restating the motion to be sure we're all clear about what we're voting on, the Moderator will call for all those in favor of the motion to say "aye" or "yes," and all those opposed to it to say "no," and will announce whether the motion has passed.

Give the Stated Clerk your written motion before you give it.

#### Amending a motion

- 1. During a debate on a motion, the Moderator may recognize a speaker who moves that the original motion be revised. For example, "Moderator, I move to amend the motion to include 'and coffee to go with the cinnamon rolls."
- 2. The motion to amend needs a second. Once done, the Moderator will recognize speakers who wish to debate the amendment.
- 3. Following the debate and restatement of the motion to amend, the Moderator will call for a vote on the amendment (**not on the original motion**).
- 4. Rarely someone will amend the amended motion. That's fine. See 1-3.
- 5. The newly amended main motion must be voted on if the amendment passes.
- 6. The original motion will be voted on if the amendment does not pass.

#### Again, give the Stated Clerk your written motion as amended.

#### Common Actions:

- **Division of the house** -- a request for a re-vote using a show of hands or by standing ("standing division") to get a clear count of the votes on either side.
- **Ballot vote:** A presbytery may request a ballot vote, and we're ready for that. Ballots are in the name tag holder commissioners wear during the meeting.
- Move to postpone (to a particular time) -- a debatable motion considered when one does not want to "table the motion" indefinitely.
- Call for the order of the day -- a request that the meeting hold to its own docket, moving directly to the item of business scheduled for that time by the earlier vote to approve the docket
- Point of order -- a request from a presbyter for clarification by the Moderator
- Move the previous question, or "call the question" -- This is to end the discussion and move to vote. It requires a second. Calling the question requires ⅔ vote. If the motion passes, move to the vote on the motion at hand. If it doesn't, the discussion on the motion may continue. Do not yell, "Call the question," from the floor. Go to a mic and address the Moderator.
- **Move to adjourn** -- We need a motion/second to adjourn at the end of the meeting, after which we will close with prayer.
